Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) II Disclosures Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students Quarter Ending March 31, 2021

The following information is provided per U.S. Department of Education reporting requirements and represents reporting for quarter two (through June 30, 2021) for the HEERF II authorized by the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act 2021 (CRRSAA), Public Law 116-260, signed into law on December 27, 2020.

- 1. Williamson College (WC) acknowledges that it has signed and returned to the U.S. Department of Education the Certification and Agreement for funds received under Section 314(a)(1) of the CRRSAA to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.
- 2. The total amount of funds WC has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement [for] Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students is \$16,439.
- 3. The total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under Section 314(a)(1) of the CRRSAA as of the date of submission (i.e., as of the 30-day Report and every 45 days thereafter) is \$0.
- 4. The estimated total number of students at WC that are eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students under the CRRSAA program is 70.
- 5. The total number of students who have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under the CRRSAA program is 0.
- 6. The method(s) used by WC to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive under Section 314(a)(1) of the CRRSAA are outlined below:
 - In alignment with the recommendations from Secretary of Education, Betsy DeVos, WC distributed the funds to enrolled Title IV aid-eligible continuing students with an expected family contribution (EFC) of \$5,713 or less for the 2020-2021 award year and new students with an expected family contribution (EFC) of \$5,848 or less for the 2021-2022 award year, i.e., to those students with the greatest identified need. Grants are prioritized to students who demonstrate the most need. Need is determined by Expected Family Contribution, as calculated by the FAFSA Federal Needs Analysis. This approach provides aid to approximately 29% of WC's students.
